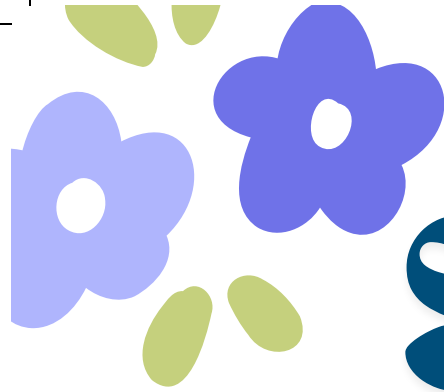

FIRST PRES FINANCES IN BRIEF

As of February 28, 2026

We want the First Pres family to understand our resources, our priorities, and our progress over time. February notes: We remain thankful for our church family, and for many gifts and blessings moving into 2026. At this time church finances are excellent. Giving is well over budget, and expenses are well below budget. These things will even out as the year progresses, but we continue to benefit from a strong end to 2025 and a more balanced financial structure moving forward. The Finance Committee would especially like to point out that we have now exceeded our \$100,000 pledge to the Justice League of Greater Lansing toward reparations benefitting the African American community! Mission giving continues to be a strong pillar of our church.

General Fund Income: includes things like annual pledges, weekly offerings, building use and rent income.

General Fund Spending: includes staff payroll, physical operations, repairs and utilities, mission giving, and other budgeted expenses.

Designated Funds: include money that may only be used for specific purposes, like the Deacons Fund, the Food Pantry, special music programming, memorial funds, etc.

The Endowment Fund: is managed to maintain a capital amount of \$2.1M that is invested and cannot be spent. Endowment earnings over and above the capital contribute to both the General Fund and various Designated Funds.

The Capital Campaign: was established to fund specific improvements to the sanctuary, the chapel, and other building needs that are not funded by the general budget or grants.

The JLGLM Pledge: was made by the church to the Justice League of Greater Lansing MI to contribute voluntary reparations for the benefit of Lansing's African American community.



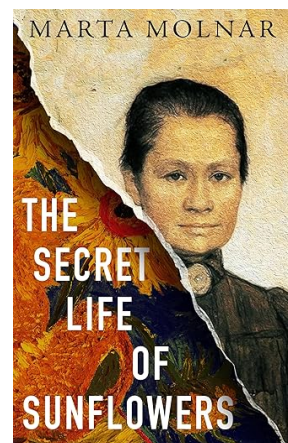
Book Group

***The Secret Life of Sunflowers* by Marta Molnar and Dana Marton**

When Hollywood auctioneer Emsley Wilson finds her famous grandmother's diary while cleaning out her New York brownstone, the pages are full of surprises. The first surprise: the diary isn't her grandmother's. It belongs to Johanna Bonger, Vincent van Gogh's sister-in-law. Johanna inherited Vincent van Gogh's paintings. They were all she had, and they weren't worth anything. She was a 28-year-old widow with a baby in the 1800s, without any means of supporting herself, living in Paris where she barely spoke the language. Yet she managed to introduce Vincent's legacy to the world. The inspiration couldn't come at a better time for Emsley. With her business failing, an unexpected love turning up in her life, and family secrets unraveling, can she find answers in the past? Discussion led by Victoria Fitton and Jean Jones.

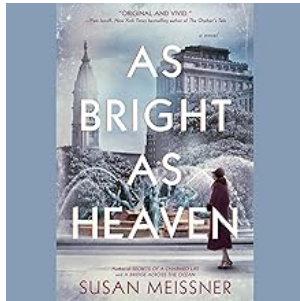

Tuesday May 5, 7:00 p.m. in the Parlor ***As Bright as Heaven* by Susan Meissner**



In 1918, Philadelphia was a city teeming with promise. Even as its young men went off to fight in the Great War, there were opportunities for a fresh start. Into this bustling town, came Pauline Bright and her husband, filled with hope that they could now give their three daughters—Evelyn, Maggie, and Willa—a chance at a better life. But just months after they arrive, the Spanish Flu reaches America. As the pandemic claims more than twelve thousand victims in their adopted city, they find their lives

left with a world that looks nothing like the one they knew. But even as they lose loved ones, they take in a baby orphaned by the disease who becomes their sole source of hope. Amidst the tragedy and challenges, they learn what they cannot live without—and what they are willing to do about it. Discussion led by Judy Whitman.

Tuesday June 2, 7:00 p.m. in the Parlor ***1776: A Musical Play* by Sherman Edwards and Peter Stone**

1776 is an inspiring and imaginative re-creation of the events from May 8 to July 4 in Philadelphia, when the second Continental Congress argued about, voted on, and signed the Declaration of Independence. From John Adams's opening diatribe to the signing of the document, 1776 is a classic musical play of mounting tension and triumph. Stone and Edwards have dramatically brought to life the legendary delegates: the ever-urbane Benjamin Franklin, the hot-blooded newlywed Thomas Jefferson, and the fiery Adams in conflict with the conservative John Dickinson. With stirring dialogue and colorful, evocative lyrics, 1776 lends an emotion and human dimension to the story that is unattainable in a history book alone. 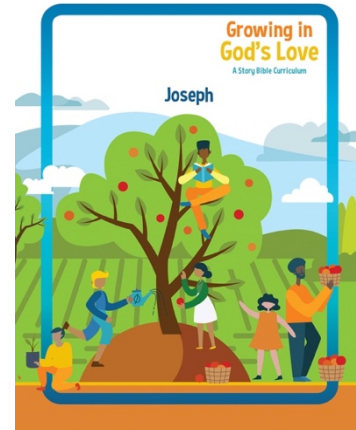

Wednesday, April 1 – The First Sunday of Easter

This is the day the Lord has made! Christ is risen, and through him all creation is made new! Indeed, "God shows no partiality" (Acts 10:34): Christ's resurrection truly brings life to everyone. We sing hymns of praise, gather around sacred words, and proclaim God's faithfulness, power, and love in the feast of holy communion. Wednesday, April 8 – The Second Sunday of Easter

In today's gospel the risen Christ appears to the disciples and offers them the gift of peace. Even amid doubts and questions, we experience the resurrection in our Sunday gathering around word and meal, and in our everyday lives. Throughout the coming Sundays of Easter, the first two readings will be from the Acts of the Apostles and the first letter of Peter. Even as the early Christians proclaimed the resurrection, we rejoice in the new birth and living hope we receive in baptism.

Wednesday, April 15 – The Third Sunday of Easter

Today's gospel begins with two disciples walking to Emmaus, overcome with sadness, loss, and disappointment. They had hoped Jesus, who was crucified, would be the one to redeem Israel! Yet the risen Christ walks with them and then opens their eyes in the breaking of the bread. Each Sunday our hearts burn within us as the scriptures are proclaimed and Christ appears to us as bread is broken and wine is poured. The story of Emmaus becomes the pattern of our worship each Lord's Day.

Anyone who was unable to attend adult forum on March 15 may be asking “What does First Pres have to do with football?” Quite frankly – everything. Just to be clear, we are talking about European football, also known as soccer, and if you’re ever curious why there are two different names for the same sport, see Darla Jackson. Real Lansing FC is a soccer program operating mostly out of Gardner School in Lansing and offers food and academic support. To participate, students need to meet academic guidelines. Refugee children are encouraged to attend. The program has grown exponentially since its inception a few years ago. Sports have demonstrated the ability to help in numerous ways from aiding bone development to helping to foster self-esteem, and Real Lansing helps players who otherwise may not have a chance to play. First Pres is a sponsor of Real Lansing, and in addition to financial support, the teams could use fans! Most of the other teams have parents and other adults on the sidelines, but Real Lansing has very few.
