## Pastor's Corner

January 6th marks the beginning of the season of Epiphany, which runs until Lent. It is a celebration of the light that came into the world in Jesus Christ, the light that shines in the darkness and was not overcome. In the western church, as opposed to the eastern Orthodox churches, where it celebrates both the birth and the baptism of Jesus, Epiphany is associated primarily with the coming of the three gift bearing kings, following the light of the star that appeared over Bethlehem. In either case, what is being lifted up is the appearance, the manifestation of the divine in our day to day lives.

As such, this awareness of God's presence can't be limited to the specific time in the church calendar. If you just aren't feeling it this time of year—perhaps the long gray winter is settling in, perhaps you're still feeling the darkness of sorrow and grief over the loss of a loved one, or for whatever reason—take heart. You are not required to feel what you aren't feeling. But neither are you required to give up hope or to despair. If nothing else, the season serves as a reminder that the light shines always—even in your time of darkness, depression and discouragement, whether you can feel it or not. It's a reminder that God can see you, even when you can't see God—a reminder that something is holding on to you when you feel abandoned, fearful, or isolated. It is the gift of hope.

The church calendar, deeply connected to the four seasons, is an arrangement of ritual time around the life of Jesus. It is a way of rooting and structuring our lives in and around the Christ—bringing the sacred into the profane. But we also live our lives in everyday non-ritual time. Indeed, we can be surprised by Grace anytime of the year! We can experience the presence of God anytime of the year!

This year, this winter, let's celebrate the light which shines in the darkness and is not overcome, either in our joy of awareness, or in the power of the promise, the strong foundation of hope, which gives us a place to stand, even when it feels like we are falling.

Happy epiphany. We are all so loved in the light! We are all held close in the light!

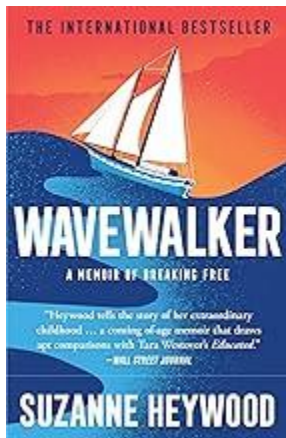
## ***A Stubborn Sweetness and Other Stories for the Christmas Season* by Katherine Paterson**

## ***Wavewalker: A Memoir of Breaking Free* by Suzanne Heywood**



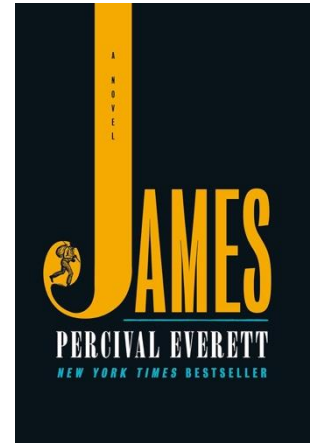
Aged just seven, Suzanne Heywood set sail with her parents and brother on a three-year voyage around the world. What followed turned instead into a decade-long way of life, through storms, shipwrecks, reefs and isolation, with little formal schooling. No one else knew where they were most of the time and no state showed any interest in what was happening to the children. Suzanne fought her parents, longing to return to England and to education and stability. This memoir covers her astonishing upbringing, a survival story of a child deprived of safety, friendships, and schooling. At seventeen Suzanne earned an interview at Oxford University and returned to the UK.

*Wavewalker* is the incredible true story of how the adventure of a lifetime became one child's worst nightmare – and how her determination to educate herself enabled her to escape. Discussion led by Jean Fellows.

***James* by Percival Everett**

When the enslaved Jim overhears that he is about to be sold to a man in New Orleans, separated from his wife and daughter forever, he decides to hide on nearby Jackson Island until he can formulate a plan. Meanwhile, Huck Finn has faked his own death to escape his violent father, recently returned to town. As all readers of American literature know, thus begins the dangerous journey by raft down the Mississippi River toward the elusive and too-often-unreliable promise of the Free States and beyond. While many narrative set pieces of *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* remain in place (floods and storms, stumbling across both unexpected death and unexpected treasure in the myriad stopping points along the river's banks, encountering the scam artists posing as the Duke and Dauphin...), Jim's agency, intelligence and compassion are shown in a radically new light. Today is the launch of the **Wired Word Social**. We'll meet in Litten Hall for this first in-person discussion of current topics from a biblical perspective, continuing on a weekly basis. See details below.



Adult Education will be starting a new curriculum titled “The Wired Word” led by Pr. Bob Hagle. This material will be distributed weekly by email and is meant to be a fresh and engaging Bible study for all adult ages.

FPC’s Adult Ed is hoping the lesson presented each week could spark most stimulating discussions and conversations germane to current events. Despite the Bible being written and translated several centuries ago, we hope you will find the Bible alive today as “The Wired Word” relates the Bible to news events happening here and now.

Each week we will be presented with two Bible study lessons. Each lesson is based on the foundations of Christian faith and includes Bible verses, biblical commentary, discussion questions, reference materials that relate to a topic in the news that week — it could even be a news event that is occurring the same day.

News is inevitable— whether it be good or bad, but what better way to extract hope from this input, is to juxtapose Bible verses as tools to persevere and navigate our daily walk in Christian faith. The “Wired Word” provides a student version of the lesson to everyone attending in advance for study preparation— especially useful when we meet virtually.

No workbooks or additional materials needed. All class materials will be provided weekly.

All this will start on **Wednesday, January 29, 2025** at 12:00 noon by Zoom and continue to meet each week on Wednesdays at 12:00 noon by Zoom. On the **fourth Wednesday of each month** (February, March, April, etc.) we will meet in person at the restaurant by the church (Salt Rock).

## MISSION AND SOCIAL JUSTICE NOTES

The Mission and Social Justice Committee contributed to the mission work of Mark Hare and Jenny Bent. Mark Hare and Jenny Bent work with Presbyterian World Mission.



Mark has been working with Presbyterian World Mission since 1997. After working in a reforestation program in Haiti for a year, he spent six years in Nicaragua focusing on developing agricultural systems and providing practical training for rural families. In 2004, he began serving in Haiti with the Farmer's Movement

of Haiti (MPP) and was able to apply much of what he had learned in Nicaragua to his work at the MPP's National Training Center. Joining Mark in Haiti after their wedding in 2008, Jenny served with MPP as a volunteer in their rural health clinic. After moving to the Dominican Republic in 2012, Mark traveled to Haiti on a monthly basis, continuing to train teams of farmers in yard garden production techniques with Haitian farmer movements. He also began learning about CHE alongside Jenny and applying its holistic techniques to teaching vegetable production.

In January 2020, Jenny and Mark brought what they learned from their work with Dominican and Haitian communities to Costa Rica where they serve as two of the members of a team of nine or ten students, administrative staff, and faculty members at the Latin American Biblical University focused on climate justice and ecological sustainability. Since 2016 the people of the Latin American Biblical University (UBL), based in the city of Montes de Oca, just to the east of San José, Costa Rica, have been on a journey of becoming a "green seminary," an institution searching to reduce harm to ecological systems and to begin regenerative practices that help heal our wounded Creation. The theologian Karla Koll, also a mission co-worker sent by World Mission, helps facilitate the work of the team.

Concretely, as members of the Green UBL team Jenny and Mark provide support for and help advance initiatives focused on conservation of water and electricity, reducing, reusing, and recycling solid waste, as well as developing liturgies with an environmental

justice focus. The team also helps promote the creation of courses with an environmental component and they organize online webinars with experts on topics such as extractive industries, regenerative agriculture, climate change and climate debt versus external debt.

The Green UBL team is also providing outreach to local churches and communities, as well as “evangelizing” the internal community of faculty and staff with concrete actions focused on Climate Justice. Since 2018, for example, the team has maintained a vegetable garden of about 25 square yards, plus an area for composting. Since 2021 they have successfully raised compost worms, producing high quality, bio-dynamic vermicompost. In 2023 they began producing some of the necessary plant starts for the garden, which requires a whole new level of skill and administration.

In 2022 the Green UBL team initiated a new, 75 square yard garden in the form of a mandala on approximately 1200 square yards of land that the university owns immediately adjacent to the main campus. At the end of 2022 the team reached out to the local community, called Cedros, and four or five older women, together with two younger women responded. In 2023, through workshops and workdays, the group continued to grow the garden space, improving their skills and knowledge, producing more and more healthy food, and strengthening their ties of friendship and service with each other, even as they found ways to invite new people into the garden space. The garden program is also nourished by and nourishes students from the nearby national Costa Rican University; the students work with the community members while they complete the community service required for graduation.

The Cedros garden team help host volunteers who come to the UBL to work in the library and the garden. In 2023 they hosted a Swiss agricultural student doing a professional internship through the Swiss NGO, “Mission Twenty-One.” The student completed research for her bachelor thesis while working with the community garden. In recognition of its dedication to climate justice and ecological sustainability, the UBL has received international certification as a “Green Seminary.” The institution is also successfully working with a Costa Rican government program called “The Blue Banner” which provides an annual certification of ecological sustainability.
