Session Notes

The Session convened on Wednesday,
October 15 with Rev. Charles Herrick as moderator.

- 1. The church will welcome in November three new members by letter of transfer from other churches, Rachel Lutes, Sarah Lutes and Sherrie Loader.
- 2. Mike Bryan, chair of the Emergency Preparedness Committee, presented recommendations regarding church safety for the Building and Grounds Committee to consider. Security measures for the church discussed were locking doors at specific times, implementing greeters, and installing security cameras.
- 3. The Nominating Committee made a motion to appoint a committee to review the bylaws and to specifically consider amending the bylaws to reduce the number of Deacons considering our smaller congregation. The motion carried and the bylaws committee will be Bill Collins, Darla Jackson and Erin Schor.
- 4. The Interim Pastoral Nominating Committee is working on the church profile and interim pastoral position description. The committee expects to start interviewing candidates in late January.

- 5. The Worship Committee met with Pastor Barb and discussed changes to the worship service.
- 6. The Membership Committee is having coffee hour in the parlor kitchen during October. The Committee proposed a Coffee Hour Committee be formed to take over the duties of coffee hour.
- 7. The **Annual Congregational meeting will be held on February 22, 2026**. The installation of new elders and deacons will be held in early January.
- 8. The State Grant work continues with work being done in the kitchen, the new elevator installation and solar panels installation (date not yet scheduled).
- 9. The Session is working diligently with staff during this time of transition in the church. The Clerk, Carol Wallace, can be contacted for concerns about the church

ROLES OF THE CHURCH: DEFINED

The Church's ordered ministries described in the New Testament and maintained by this church are deacons and presbyters (*ministers of the Word and Sacrament and ruling elders*). Ordered ministries are gifts to the church to order its life so that the ministry of the whole people of God may flourish. The existence of these ordered ministries in no way diminishes the importance of the commitment of all members to the total ministry of the church.

Deacon Defined

The ministry of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of compassion, witness, and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless, the oppressed, those burdened by unjust policies or structures, or anyone in distress.

Ruling Elder Defined

Ruling elders are so named not because they "lord it over" the congregation (Matt. 20:25), but because they are chosen by the congregation to discern and measure its fidelity to the Word of God, and to strengthen and nurture its faith and life. Ruling elders, together with ministers of the Word and Sacrament, exercise leadership, government, spiritual discernment, and discipline and have responsibilities for the life of a congregation as well as the whole church, including ecumenical relationships.

Minister of the Word and Sacrament Defined

Ministers of the Word and Sacrament (also called teaching elders and pastors) shall in all things be committed to teaching the faith in word and deed and equipping

the saints for the work of ministry (Eph. 4:12). They may serve in a variety of ministries, as authorized by the presbytery. When they serve as preachers and teachers of the Word, they shall preach and teach the faith of the church, so that the people are shaped by the pattern of the gospel and strengthened for witness and service. When they serve at font and table, they shall interpret and "show forth" the mysteries of grace in word and action, lifting the people's vision toward the hope of God's new creation. When they serve as pastors, they shall support the people in the disciplines of the faith amid the struggles of daily life. When they serve as presbyters, they shall participate in the responsibilities of governance, seeking always to discern the mind of Christ and to build up Christ's body through devotion, debate, and decision. Book of Order 2025/27

Top Ten Responsibilities of Session

- **Evangelism**: Inviting people into the new life in Christ and receiving them into membership when they are ready to join.
- **Mission and Justice**: Leading the congregation in participation in the mission of the whole Church in the world.
- **Education and Care**: Providing for the education, ordination, mission, and care of members.
- Financial Stewardship: Overseeing financial stewardship and church property.
- **Discipline**: Maintaining discipline within the congregation.
- Worship: Providing that the Word of God be preached and heard, primarily through worship.
- Sacraments: Authorizing the celebration of the sacraments.
- **Membership**: Receiving and dismissing members.
- **Budget and Distribution**: Preparing and adopting a budget and determining the distribution of the congregation's benevolences.
- Community Engagement: Leading the congregation in ministries of personal and social healing and reconciliation in the communities in which the church lives and bears its witness.

Responsibilities of Deacons

Deacons may be individually commissioned or organized as a board of deacons. In either case, their ministry is under the supervision and authority of the session. Deacons may also be given special assignments in the congregation, such as caring for members in need, handling educational tasks, cultivating liberality in giving, collecting and disbursing monies to specific persons or causes, or overseeing the buildings and

property of the congregation. Deacons shall assume other duties as may be delegated to them by the session, including assisting with the Lord's Supper.

Responsibilities of a Presbyterian Member

Presbyterian members have several responsibilities, including participating in the worship and life of the church, participation in the mission and justice of the church, and being involved in the financial stewardship and church property. They are also expected to witness their faith in word and deed, inviting other into the new life in Christ, and leading the congregation in participation in the mission of the whole Church in the world.

Besides attending worship, please think of your gifts and join a committee, participate in a program, and be part of our community of fellowship. YOU are welcome here!

Colors of the Church Calendar Year 2025



The colors we use in our Sanctuary mark the different seasons of church life. Each color carries a special meaning:

- **Purple** *Advent* and *Lent*
- White Holy Days such as Christmas, Easter, and Communion
- Green Common or Growing Season
- **Red** Pentecost

In November, we honor All Saints' Day (November 2) with white paraments, and later celebrate Christ the King Sunday (November 23)—the end of the church calendar year—with white and *all* our liturgical colors, rejoicing in Jesus' victory over all evil in the world.

Between these observances, our paraments will be **green**, representing *Growing Time*!

Soon it will be **Advent**, the beginning of the church year, when our Sanctuary will be dressed in **purple** and adorned with **evergreens**—symbols of the everlasting life Jesus came to give us. (You can find the Liturgical Calendar Color Wheel Poster outside of Megan's Office)

Audio Video System Updates

Our church technology updates have followed us to regular worship in the sanctuary this fall. We now have video screens at each side of the front of the sanctuary to display slides for readings, responses, and hymns, as well as closed captions for sermons and prayers. The captions, in particular, have proven very helpful to many attendees.

Much of the PA system has been overhauled, though we are still waiting for installation of a new sanctuary loudspeaker. So we anticipate yet more improvement in hearing the spoken word. Meanwhile, we have new hearing-assistance devices that perform more clearly than the old ones. The new devices allow regular ear buds to plug in, or the use of a neck loop for users of hearing aids that have a "T" (T-coil or Telecoil) setting. Also the new hearing assistance system will stream to bluetooth-enabled hearing aids using the WaveCAST smartphone app. Please see an usher for an instruction sheet if you are interested in this feature! (Detailed instructions are included on page 15.)

The AV and communication updates throughout the building were a well-used point of pride when we hosted the 3rd Annual *Jesus + Justice Advocacy Conference* in late September.

The production team also welcomes Rachel Lutes to the team of Sunday worship AV producers, joining Bill Collins, Andrew Mackoul, and Trent Mitchell.




The Seal of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)

The seal of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is a symbolic expression of the church's heritage, identity, and mission. Every element of the design reflects an aspect of faith and tradition within the Presbyterian and Reformed heritage.

At the center is the **cross**, the universal and most ecumenical symbol of the Christian Church.

- **The Dove** The uppermost part of the cross forms a descending dove, symbolizing the **Holy Spirit** and the **sacrament of baptism**.
- **The Fish** Within the dove, the shape of a fish recalls an early Christian sign for **Christ**.
- The Open Book The upper arms of the cross suggest an open Bible, representing Scripture and the Reformed tradition's emphasis on God's Word.
- The Pulpit Beneath the book is a pulpit or lectern, symbolizing the preaching of God's Word at the heart of Presbyterian worship.
- The Chalice and Robe Within this same area are a cup or chalice, representing the Lord's Supper, and a robe, representing the humanity of Jesus Christ.
- The Flames The lower part of the seal contains flames forming a subtle triangle, the traditional symbol of the Trinity. The flames also recall both God's revelation to Moses in the burning bush and the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.



Together, these symbols express the fullness of the Presbyterian Church's faith — rooted in Scripture, centered on Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, and called to serve the world.

WaveCAST Hearing Assistance App Instructions

Our new sanctuary hearing assistance system allows those who have Bluetooth-enabled hearing aids to stream the PA system audio directly to their hearing aids using the *WaveCAST* smartphone app. To use the *WaveCAST* app, follow these instructions.

1. Download the WaveCAST App

Download the *WaveCAST* app to your smartphone from the Apple App Store or Google Play Store, depending on your device. *WaveCAST* is a product of Williams Sound LLC and uses the logo at right:

Note: You should be able to download the app over the church Wi-Fi, but you may find it easier to download the app from home in advance.


2. Join the Sanctuary Hearing Assistance Wi-Fi network
In the church sanctuary, open the Wi-Fi settings on your
phone to view available networks and log into the *Hearing*Assistance Wi-Fi network, password: 5174820668

3. Open the WaveCAST App and Select Sanctuary Audio Channel

Then open the *WaveCAST* app. Once connected, the app will display a search window and the *Sanctuary* audio channel.

Tap the word to select the *Sanctuary* audio channel. Sanctuary PA system audio should immediately stream to your connected hearing aids.

When the app is streaming audio, you will see an icon to stop or play the audio stream, and a volume slider. Volume can also be adjusted using the normal phone volume controls.



Note: This part of the system will only work with hearing aids that are paired by Bluetooth to a smartphone. If you have other kinds of hearing aids, ask an usher for a transmitter with a neck loop (for T-coil enabled hearing aids), or use a transmitter with ordinary earphones.





Navajo Code Talkers of WWII by Chester Nez

His name wasn't Chester Nez. That was the English name he was assigned in kindergarten. And in boarding school at Fort Defiance, he was punished for speaking his native language, as the teachers sought to rid him of his culture and traditions. But discrimination didn't stop Chester from answering the call to defend his country after Pearl Harbor, for the Navajo have always been warriors, and his upbringing on a New Mexico reservation gave him the strength—both physical and mental—to excel as a marine. During World War II, the Japanese had managed to crack every code the United States



used. But when the Marines turned to its Navajo recruits to develop and implement a secret military language, they created the only unbroken code in modern warfare—and helped assure victory for the United States over Japan in the South Pacific.

While delivering coal to the local convent, he begins to suspect that their supposed training school for girls is, in fact, a cruelly abusive Iaundry. Bill attempts to ignore the disturbing events at the convent, as his wife suggests. Feeling restless, he decides to visit the local pub owner, who warns Bill not to publicly criticize the convent since the church is involved in all parts of town life. He returns to the convent, where he finds one of the girls locked out in the cold. He



gives her his coat and walks with her back to his own house, attracting attention from the locals they pass by. He reaches his front door, fearful but optimistic that doing the right thing will work out.



- Personal and spiritual formation
 - Regular study is described as shaping character, worship, and daily living, not just information.
- Guidance for life and ethics
 - Scripture is used for instruction, correction, and practical wisdom in moral decisions.

Practical outcomes often highlighted

- Faith and understanding
 - Scripture is said to deepen faith and provide understanding of God's promises and purposes.
- Transformation and growth
 - The aim is transformation—knowing God better, aligning with truth, and growing in maturity.
- Cultural and historical literacy
 - Studying the Bible also enhances familiarity with a text that has shaped culture, law, art, and literature

CLIMATE FRIENDLY COOKING & EATING

- TREAD MORE GENTLY

PEC is thrilled to share the efforts of the Earth Care Committee of Montclair Presbyterian Church in Oakland, CA and encourage you to purchase their cookbook: *Climate Friendly Cooking: 111 Recipes to Help Save the Planet*, written and edited by Suzanne Jones and Leslie Louie. Who knew that food could help with creation care? Both Montclair and PEC insist that eating lower on the food chain, cooking with plants and not animals, will help reduce greenhouse gas emissions. "In the most comprehensive analysis to date of dietary patterns and their climate impact, researchers have found that vegan diets create 75% less greenhouse gas emissions than meat-heavy diets." [1] Are we suggesting that you should move to an entirely plant-based diet? No, not at all. But we are encouraging you to move in that direction, maybe one, two, or three days a week. Even a small commitment will make a difference.

The Montclair cookbook says, "Humans have complex relationships with food. Food is deeply connected to our habits, emotions, and identities." It also reflects our hospitality. "It can be a source of comfort and familiarity, health and well-being, and creativity and self-expression. We use food to communicate affection and to maintain family and cultural traditions. Enjoying food

with those we love is one of life's greatest pleasures. Yet sadly, our current ways of feeding ourselves are not sustainable. Global food production accounts for at least 26% of the world's greenhouse gas emissions, and animal agriculture—livestock, fish farms, and the feed and land they require—accounts for over half of those emissions."[2]

Purchase Montclair's <u>Climate Friendly Cooking</u>: 111 Recipes to Help Save the Planet for \$10 (select cookbook) or other plant-based cookbooks and blogs. Cook with a friend or family member. Get creative with your cooking and you could just help save the planet.



STEWARDSHIP 2026

As we approach 2026, the Session is preparing the tentative 2026 budget for the church. As most of you know, pledges are our church's most important source of income making up nearly **70% of the General Fund budget**.

As we begin our annual Stewardship Campaign, we prayerfully ask that you consider **maintaining or increasing your pledge for 2026** to help support the ongoing ministry and mission of our church.

Our Session and its committees have worked diligently to reduce spending and raise additions funds to close the General Funds deficit. Our members and friends are faithfully fulfilling their pledges, and we are receiving \$135,000 of funds from the Endowment Fund in 2025 which we anticipate can be matched or exceeded in 2026.

Because of staffing reductions and changes, the deficit for this year should remain manageable. The Session's goal is to maintain the same level of General Fund budget in 2026 as we have in 2025, as we anticipate the hiring of an interim pastor and addressing the impacts of inflation for church staff and overhead. Your financial support is vital in this effort.

We are also deeply grateful for the blessings our congregation has received this year. The **State of Michigan grant of \$500,000** has enabled major facility improvements to enhance our outreach to the community. Our **kitchen has been modernized**, and a **new elevator** will be installed in the coming weeks. In addition, the **strong performance of the Endowment Fund** has provided another **\$37,900**, and **Capital Campaign funds** have greatly improved the audio-visual technology in our sanctuary—enhancing worship for all. New **carpeting and pew cushions** have added beauty and comfort to our worship space.

We now ask you to join us in supporting the 2026 Stewardship Campaign. A pledge card will be mailed by NOVEMBER 1 to our members and friends of the church with prayerful hope that it will be returned **on NOVEMBER 16**, **Commitment Sunday**, when we joyfully celebrate our faith and shared commitment to Lansing First Presbyterian. If you are unable to attend worship that day, you may also mail your pledge card to the church.

Thank you for your continued generosity and for helping us serve God's mission in our neighborhood, our community, and the world.

Finance Committee

First Pres Finances in Brief As of September 30, 2025 We want the First Pres family to understand our resources, our priorities, and our progress over time.

September notes: Income minus spending was positive for the month, and the overall deficit has improved by about \$7,500. We expect more gains while payroll savings continue and our congregation continues its generous support of bottom-line finances as well as special missions and projects. We have begun looking ahead to the 2026 budget and understanding our needs for next year as we plan the fall Stewardship Campaign.

General Fund Income: includes things like annual pledges, weekly offerings, building use and rent income.

General Fund Spending: includes staff payroll, physical operations, repairs and utilities, mission giving, and other budgeted expenses.

Designated Funds: include money that may only be used for specific purposes, like the Deacons Fund, the Food Pantry, special music programming, memorial funds, etc.

The Endowment Fund: is managed to maintain a capital amount of \$2.1M that is invested and cannot be spent. Endowment earnings over and above the capital contribute to both the General Fund and various Designated Funds.

The Capital Campaign: was established to fund specific improvements to the sanctuary, the chapel, and other building needs that are not funded by the general budget or grants.

The JLGLM Pledge: was made by the church to the Justice League of Greater Lansing MI to contribute voluntary reparations for the benefit of Lansing's African American community.
